Eternal One: Don't revel only in the past, or spend all your time recounting the victories of days gone by. Watch closely: I am preparing something new; it's happening now, even as I speak, and you're about to see it. I am preparing a way through the desert; Waters will flow where there had been none.

The prophet Isaiah appeals to a powerful memory: THE EXODUS. He reminds God's people—all descendants of slaves in Egypt—how God liberated them from oppression, how God destroyed the powerful army that pursued them in order to take them back to the whip and lash, back to slavery in Egypt. Stories of the exodus have been told time after time for many generations. The prophet evokes these amazing memories to comfort them and assure them that what God is about to do is like what God did do for their ancestors centuries ago.

God yearns for each of us to start fresh-new grace and new mercy for each new day-yet, we are held captive by our past. Forget the former things, do not dwell on the past; God's promise is for something new, something fresh - we are to live in today. Still, the world is cruel - unforgiving and unforgetting. People don't let us change - a reputation that haunts us; the internet preserves unflattering pictures; damaging reviews of restaurants or hotels. "Watch, I am doing a new thing." It's an invitation from the Lord. The next phrase makes it clear, God is already doing something new. "It's happening now." God loves doing new things. God does new things. God is making a path through the desert. He is causing the water to flow where there has been none.

Ponder these two questions as we eagerly move into 2019 - What new thing am I being called to? What new thing is our church being called to?
