AN ALL SAINTS THANKSGIVING REFLECTION

Grace and Peace,

Thanksgiving Day is a formal secular

holiday for giving thanks and sharing community with family and friends.

Gratitude, however, isn't just for the season of Thanksgiving, it's part of a healthy spiritual life. It's everywhere in the Bible, from the Psalms ("Enter his gates with thanksgiving, and his courts with praise! Give thanks to him; bless his name!" Psalm 100:4), to the Gospel of Luke (17:1-19) where Jesus cured the 10 lepers — and only one returned to thank him and praise God.

Some of us live close enough to our immediate families that sitting down with them and sharing a meal on this one day is less about family and more about gratitude. Others who live far from family, who for one reason or another can't celebrate with family, bond with friends and neighbors, giving thanks for them being in your life.

The month of November begins with All Saints Day. This observance has always been a time for people to remember and pray for the those who have passed away. Its history is long and deep in terms of where the origins arise, how it plays into Halloween, and what various cultures do to celebrate the day.

All Saints Day, also known as All Hallows' Day, or Hallowmas, is a Christian celebration in honor of all the saints from Christian history. In Western Christianity, it is observed on November 1st by the Roman Catholic Church, the Methodist Church, the Lutheran Church, and other Protestant denominations. The Eastern Orthodox Church and associated Eastern Catholic churches observe All Saints Day on the first Sunday following Pentecost.

The Christian festival of All Saints Day comes from a conviction that there is a spiritual connection between those in Heaven and on Earth. In Catholic tradition, the holiday honors all those who have passed on to the Kingdom of Heaven. It is a national holiday in numerous historically Catholic countries. In Methodist tradition, All Saints Day relates to giving God earnest gratitude for the lives and deaths of his saints, remembering those who were well-known and not.
